

## Bachelor of Arts Degree in Environmental Studies Worksheet (Students Entering Fall 2023 and following)

Overview: Students must complete all of the General Education requirements, plus the Major specific requirements. At least one course must be taken in each subject area. Exemplar courses are provided, or a course or endeavor that matches the subject area - as indicated in course catalogue or course syllabi - can be written in. Some courses can be applied to multiple subject areas, however, if a course is written into one area it cannot also be applied to a second area. An Endeavor applied to a subject area can also apply simultaneously to the Endeavor requirement.
